The 2020 Miegunyah Writer's Fellowship

Guidelines for Applicants

The Ian Potter Museum of Art is currently developing a large-scale multidisciplinary exhibition for 2022 with the working title Eucalypt. Grounded in the material held in the Russell and Mab Grimwade Miegunyah Collection, the holdings of Indigenous art in the University Art Collection, and historical and contemporary art, this exhibition will explore our physical and emotional responses to this loaded Australian symbol which inhabits a good proportion of our continent and its diverse environments. As a catalyst for a number of issues such as climate change, bushfire management, Indigenous sovereignty, Australian identity and nationalism, and the difference in migrant responses to our natural environment, the exhibition will bring together both historical and contemporary connections to our iconic tree.

The Russell and Mab Grimwade Bequest is an extensive collection of cultural material from the estate of Sir Russell and Lady Grimwade. A scientist, businessman and philanthropist, Sir Russell (1879-1955) had wide-ranging interests embracing industry, botany and art. In this he was strongly supported by Mab (née Kelly, 1887–1973). Their Collection and their Toorak home 'Miegunyah' were bequeathed to the University of Melbourne in Sir Russell's will of 1949 and presented to the University after Mab's death in 1973. The Collection comprises works of art of various media, a thousand rare books, historical documents and other memorabilia, and accordingly, is housed at the Ian Potter Museum of Art, the Baillieu Library and the University of Melbourne's Archives. Together it reflects the Grimwades' diverse interests, in particular, in Pacific exploration and Australian, especially Melbourne's, history.

The Eucalyptus exhibition project will encompass two residencies for creative practitioners outside of the visual arts, to underline the multidisciplinary scope of the exhibition. The first of these residencies will take place in the second half of 2020, and is for a writer to develop a work/portfolio of works that engage the theme of 'eucalypt', utilising Russell Grimwade's interest in gums and the Grimwade Collection as a starting point. In discussion with the curators, writing produced during this residency will be publicly presented in conjunction with the exhibition and published in the exhibition catalogue.

The University of Melbourne offers a vibrant research context for the successful applicant, access to experts across a range of academic disciplines, and membership of the University of Melbourne library during the residency. Aspects of the University Art Collection will be available in consultation with the Museum's Collection Manager and Grimwade Collection Curator.

The Fellowship:

- The Miegunyah Writers Fellowship will give one writer resources and time to undertake research and begin work upon a written project focused on the theme of 'eucalypt'
- The Fellowship is available to writers resident in Australia.
- The successful applicant will be awarded \$20,000.
- Return travel costs to Melbourne and studio accommodation/workspace at the University of Melbourne's Norma Redpath studio in Parkville, supported by the Centre of Visual Art (CoVA) at the University of Melbourne, will be provided if the successful candidate is from interstate.
- On-campus office space will be available if the writer is Melbourne-based.
- University of Melbourne library membership will be provided for the duration of the residency.
- The Fellowship is for a maximum of 6-8 consecutive weeks and must take place between July and September 2020.
- The finished work will be due in July 2021 for publication in 2022.
- Aspects of the finished work will be published in a catalogue accompanying the Eucalypt exhibition in 2022. The Ian Potter Museum of Art reserves the right to decline this publishing opportunity on the basis of quality/unsuitability.

Eligibility

- Proposals must be for work that reflects the theme of eucalypt
- Proposals must be from published writers
- Proposals can be for a range of creative written forms, including short fiction, creative nonfiction, poetry, dramatic script

Selection Criteria

- Literary merit
- The relevance of the proposed project to the theme
